Background:

The Community Services Department hosted Adult Softball and Basketball Leagues during the Winter 2025 Season. The Adult Softball league was held on Monday nights located at the Community Center Sports Park on the Softball field and the Adult Basketball League was held on Thursday nights inside the Community Center Gymnasium. Adult Basketball consisted of six (6) teams and Adult Softball consisted of five (5) teams. Both leagues had a ten (10) game regular season and one (1) playoff night with three (3) scheduled games per week beginning at 6:30pm each week. Each player of the 1st place teams received a Championship T-Shirt at the end of the season. In addition to the Winter 2025 Basketball Season, Community Services Staff is partnering with surrounding cities to host the second annual "Inter-City Showcase." This will be a one-day event taking place at the Laguna Hills Community Center Gymnasium. Each city will be inviting teams from their own City leagues to participate in games versus another City. Recommendation: That the Parks and Recreation Commission receive an update on the annual 4th of July Celebration.

Background:

The City of Laguna Hills will host its annual Fourth of July Celebration at the Laguna Hills Sports Complex on Friday, July 4, 2025. The event will begin at 4:00 PM and the tentative schedule is as follows:

<u>Event Schedule</u>	
4:00 PM – 8:50 PM	Activities, games, food, and vendor/information booths
4:00 PM – 6:00 PM	Music provided by sound equipment vendor functioning as DJ with recorded music. Band setup.
6:00 PM – 8:50 PM	Live Music: Anthem Road
8:50 PM	Mayor’s Welcome/Comments/Presentation of Colors
9:00 PM	National Anthem
9:05 PM – 9:25 PM	Firework show

The elements for this event are further described below.

Activities/Games: Five (5) inflatables will be rented this year to provide additional activities. The anticipated inflatables are:

- Shooting Stars Basketball
- Football Challenge
- Skee Ball Inflatable
- Adrenaline Rush (obstacle course)
- 360 Extreme Obstacle Course

In a cost-saving effort, there will be no carnival rides this year. The quote that was obtained was \$20,000 for two rides, which is a \$5,000 price increase from last year. Last year, the total sales for ride tickets was \$5,017.

Additional activities will include face painting and children's crafts.

Music: This year's musical entertainment will be provided by Anthem Road, a high-energy band performing a wide range of popular hits.

The sound company will provide pre-recorded music from 4:00 PM to 6:00 PM while the band sets up on the soccer field stage.

Food: Staff will reach out to local nonprofits to sell food at the event. Last year, Laguna Hills High School Music Boosters and Water Polo Boosters participated in the event and sold the following items:

- LHHS Music Boosters: nachos, churros, popcorn, and candy
- LHHS Water Polo Boosters: shaved ice and water

To ensure that there is an adequate amount of food for those in attendance, staff will secure a minimum of five (5) food vendors for 4th of July event. Last year, the food vendors in attendance included:

- Balvina's Mexican Kitchen
- The Family Ice Cream
- MC Kabob Grill
- Bigfoot Loaded Corndogs
- Yummy Bird LLC

- Fried Out

Information Booths & Displays: Informational booths and community displays will once again be included. Staff is coordinating content and giveaways for the City's booth. In 2024, participants included:

- City of Laguna Hills
- Orange County Sheriff's Department
- Laguna Hills Chamber of Commerce
- 3/5 Support Committee and 3/5 Marine displays

Team Dark Horse has been invited to attend in support of the City's adopted Marines of the 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines.

2025 Fireworks Display Agreement

At the April 22, 2025 meeting, City Council approved the firework display agreement.

This year, staff has secured a proposal from Garden State Fireworks (GSF), a new vendor for 2025. The previous provider, Fireworks America, is unavailable. GSF comes highly recommended, and staff is confident in their abilities.

Fireworks Show Details:

- 600 × 3" Aerial Display Shells
- 260 × 4" Aerial Display Shells
- 1,500 effects/shots from Multi-Shot Cake Devices (ranging from 25 to 665 shots each)
- Duration: Approximately 18–20 minutes
- Cost: \$47,000

Note: Previous shows included 5" shells; however, due to fallout zone limitations, 5" shells are not permitted.

Fiscal Impact:

The budget for this year's 4th of July event is proposed at \$105,500 including a \$47,000 fireworks budget. The final budget will be established by the biennial budget process.

Issue: Park Quality Program

Recommendation: That the Parks and Recreation Commission receive an update on the Park Quality Control Program.

Background:

Beginning in September 1997, the Parks and Recreation Commission was tasked with inspecting the fourteen (14) City parks on a quarterly basis as part of the City's Park Quality Control Program. One (1) new Commissioner has been appointed, and staff is re-introducing this program to the Commission. Currently, the City maintains its parks through a landscape maintenance contract and the contractor is responsible for reporting issues regarding the City's parks. In addition, the City's Parks Supervisor conducts a thorough, on-site visit of each park every week to evaluate the quality of maintenance work being done, inspect the condition of the play equipment, and to look for potential safety hazards and other problems. To augment this inspection work effort, and to provide a "resident perspective" of the park facilities and landscape standards, staff encourages the Commission's participation with the City's Park Quality Control Program. The Commission's feedback on park maintenance, landscaping, facilities, and park safety will be helpful to staff. A proposed schedule for Commission park checks is provided on Attachment 1. Staff suggests a rotating quarterly schedule to allow each Commissioner to visit each park over the course of one year-and in most cases to visit a park more than once per year. Two (2) Commissioners are assigned to a park per quarter with the understanding that each Commissioner's schedule is busy and a park visit by a Commissioner may not be possible during a particular quarter. The proposed schedule was drafted to provide as much coverage for park inspections as possible. Also attached to the staff report is the "Park Quality Control List" to be used to

report on each park inspection (see Attachment 2). The form should be submitted to the Community Services Department or directly to Parks Supervisor Ryan Hanley, who in turn will address any issues highlighted in the Commissioner's inspection report.

Recommendation: That the Parks and Recreation Commission receive and file the report.

Background:

On Saturday, April 12th, from 9am to 11am, staff held the City's second annual Hoppin' Hills event on the Town Green of the Community Center. The event included a magic show, donuts from Karzy Eddy's, coffee from Starbucks, fruit, backyard games, crafts, community partner booths, and photos with a character bunny. The event was also visited by firefighters and a fire truck for kids to interact with and tour. The event was well-attended with an estimated 400 participants.

The event had three Title Sponsors, including Financial Partners Credit Union, Renewal by Andersen, and Wave Therapy. Polly's Pies donated about 300 kid's meal certificates and Elevate Balloon Bar provided an in-kind donation of two balloon stands that served as decor for our photo opportunity area. Our three Title Sponsors each had a booth at the event and were able to interact with the public and speak before the crowd. The City and OCFA both had booths with giveaways and flyers promoting upcoming events. We also had 7 booths for our class instructors promoting their upcoming summer classes. These classes included the following: karate, yoga, ballroom dancing, art, tai chi, mommy and me music, and youth sports camps.

Fiscal Impact:

Total expenditures to date for this event are \$2,941. Staff also secured \$1,500 in sponsorships for the event, resulting in \$1,441 net expenditures.

Issue: 2025 Memorial Day Half Marathon, 10K, and 5K Honoring USMC Team Darkhorse Pre-Event Report

Recommendation: That the Parks and Recreation Commission receive and file the 2025 Memorial Day Half Marathon, 5K, and 10K pre-event report.

Background:

The City of Laguna Hills' annual Memorial Day Half Marathon, 5K, and 10K Honoring the USMC Darkhorse Battalion ("race") will take place on Monday, May 26, 2025, with a race start time of 7:00 a.m. Event registration began on October 30th, 2024, and there are approximately 930 participants registered at this time.

The 3/5 Marines Support Committee ("Team Darkhorse") has selected USMC Combat Veteran Sergeant Jarrett Kraft as the 2025 Grand Marshal. His biography is included in this report as Attachment 1. The City Council, at its October 24, 2023 meeting, directed staff to prepare an authorizing resolution for community assistance funding in the amount of \$10,000 per year, removing the pledge formula that was established in 2011. Participants can still choose to donate \$3 or \$5 to Team Darkhorse at the time of race registration checkout.

Each year, the Memorial Day race includes a beer garden as part of its post-race festivities. This tradition not only enhances the participant experience but also provides a fundraising opportunity for a local nonprofit organization. The selected nonprofit is responsible for recruiting and managing volunteers to assist with the beer garden operations, and they will receive a \$500 donation. In order to receive a daily license for beer and wine sales from the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control, the

permit applicant must be an existing nonprofit organization.

At its April 22, 2025 meeting, City Council approved the Parentis Foundation, which is based in Laguna Hills, to be the nonprofit beer garden partner. The organization's mission is to address the critical issue of childhood illiteracy—a major contributor to generational poverty—by pairing volunteer mentors aged 50 and over with elementary students grades 1 through 5 who are reading below grade level. Volunteers with the Parentis Foundation commit to working with 2–3 children each week, meeting two times per week for 30-minute tutoring sessions either in-person or virtually via Zoom. This intergenerational mentorship approach not only supports literacy but also fosters meaningful connections between seniors and youth in our community. The organization's efforts help create a brighter future by uniting generations through a shared love of learning and reading.

Attachment 2 shows the design of the shirt and medal for the 2025 event.

The course maps are attached to this report (Attachment 3). As the City Council may recall, the course was altered slightly in 2024 so that runners spend less time on street surfaces, helping with participant safety and minimizing impact on surrounding cities. Those changes were well-received and there are no anticipated changes to the routes this year.

Fiscal Impact:

The budget for the 2025 Memorial Day race event is \$205,000. Staff anticipates the generated revenue will be between \$170,000-\$190,000.

Attachment 1: Sgt. Jarrett Kraft Bio – Submitted by Team Darkhorse

Our city is honored to have as our 2025 Grand Marshal of the Laguna Hills Memorial Day Half Marathon, 5K and 10K race, a decorated Marine Corps veteran who continues to dedicate himself to service. We had the pleasure of speaking with Sgt Kraft and share below some of what he told us. Come meet Meet Sgt Kraft!

A MAN OF HONOR

When asked what inspired him to enlist in the Marines, he says, ““One of my goals as a kid was to be a US Marine and serve in the infantry. This was due to many members of my family being service members across all branches, including my parents. I used to watch Heartbreak Ridge, Platoon, and Full Metal Jacket on repeat growing up. My other goal was to have a career in law enforcement, which I’m currently fulfilling.”

Sgt Jarrett Kraft enlisted in the United States Marine Corps in 2000. His primary MOS was 0341 (infantry mortar man), with a secondary MOS of Marine Corps Security Forces. The September 11 attack on the World Trade Center occurred during his recruit training at MCRD San Diego, and soon it became clear his missions would be in combat zones.

A MAN OF ACTION

In April 2004, Sgt Kraft checked into the (Darkhorse) 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, Weapons Company; 4 months later 3/5 was deployed to Iraq in combat operations known as Operation Phantom Fury.

While deployed to Iraq, Sgt. Kraft was awarded his second Navy Achievement Medal with a combat Valor device attached for actions performed while under enemy fire. These operations were part of Operation Phantom Fury.

In December 2004, Sgt Kraft and his Marines were engaged in a two-hour-long firefight inside a residence during Operation Task Force Bruno. Three of his Marines were killed in action, and several others were severely wounded, including himself.

Several books have been published, and documentaries have been aired on the Military Channel, depicting and illustrating the actions performed by Darkhorse Marines while serving during the Iraq war.

Sgt Kraft received an honorable discharge from the Marine Corps and soon after began working with the Fresno Police Department.

In October 2005, Lt. Gen. Richard Natonski contacted him and told him he was being awarded the Navy Cross for actions performed in December 2004. The Navy Cross is the highest valor award in the Marine Corps, second only to the military Medal of Honor.

He was awarded the Navy Cross at the PELCO Corporation in Clovis, California.

A MAN OF COURAGE

He began work as a sworn Fresno Police Officer in 2006 until the present day. He has held many assignments, including patrol officer, tactical officer assigned to various teams, motorcycle officer, detective assigned to the Multi-Agency Gang Enforcement Consortium, otherwise known as M.A.G.E.C., rangemaster, and instructor assigned to the Fresno Police Dept. Regional Training Center. He is a member of the Fresno Police Honor Guard and Color Guard. He also holds certifications as an FBI-certified Hazardous Devices Technician, explosive breacher, and Tactical Bomb Technician assigned as a team leader with the Bomb Squad/EOD unit. He was promoted to Police Sergeant in December 2022 and is currently assigned as a supervisor of a tactical response team.

Sgt. Kraft has attended several Marine Corps Birthday Balls, Veteran Day parades, and functions hosted by the Fresno Police Department and the Legion of Valor. As a guest speaker, he shares with as many Americans as he can, the heroism displayed by U.S. Marines and service members from all military branches perform while deployed on foreign soil.

WHAT THOUGHTS WOULD YOU LIKE TO SHARE WITH US ON MEMORIAL DAY?

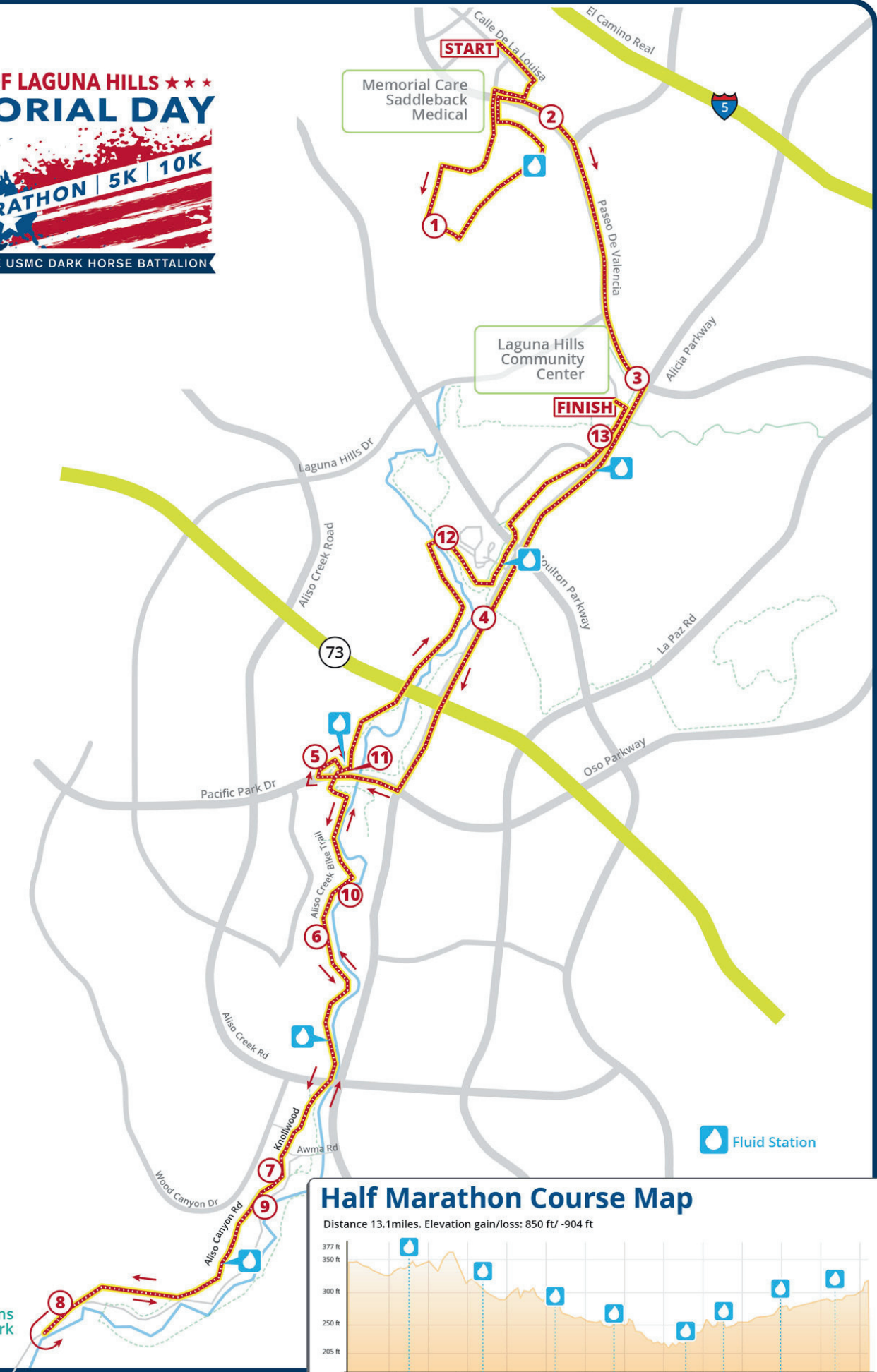
“Something I would like to share about this special day is how inspirational it is, as well as the bravery, selflessness, and strength of the brotherhood and sisterhood of our armed forces service members.

What I experienced while serving in 3/5 with my Marines during that combat deployment is something I have never experienced again, nor will I ever. It’s incredible how Marines adapt to circumstances no matter how bad the situation is and still joke, laugh, and emphasize positivity. I learned many life lessons from those guys, lessons I use during my day-to-day, lessons I share with law enforcement officers. I’ve realized that no matter how overwhelmed, stressed, or bad something may seem, “It could always be worse.”

I want to thank every service member, every Darkhorse Marine, for your selfless service to our country and for being my brother and sister. I want to thank our fallen veterans who gave the ultimate sacrifice for our country, for each one of us.

Darkhorse Marines such as Corporal Raleigh Smith, Lance Corporal James Phillips, and Lance Corporal Eric Hillenburg of 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment. Till Valhalla, my brothers, rest in peace, warriors.”





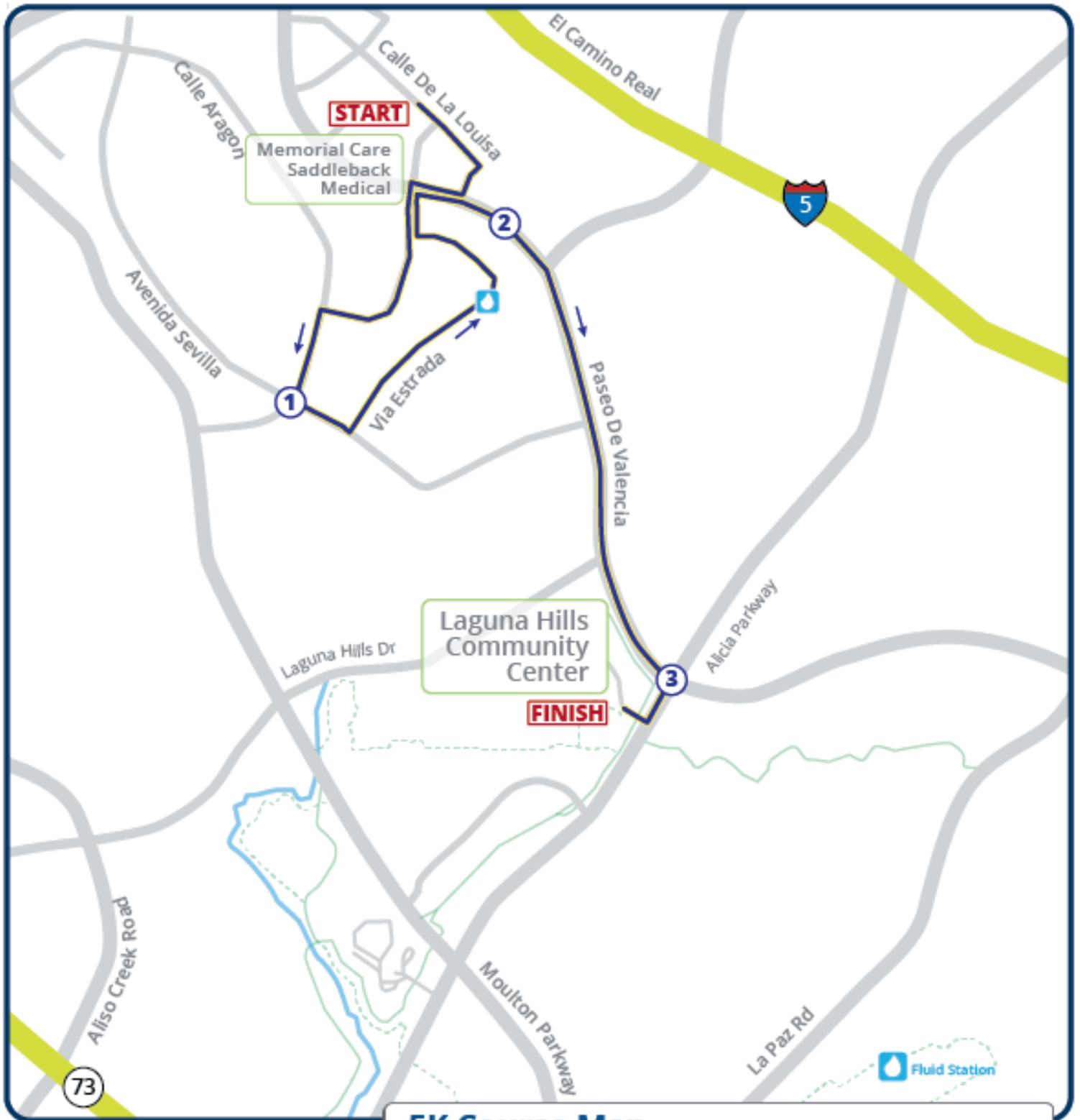
Aliso & Wood Canyons

Background:

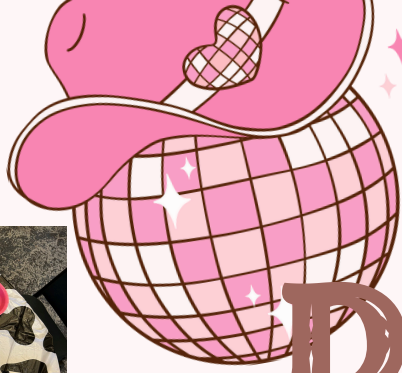
