RECOMMENDATION: PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION RECOMMEND TO THE CITY COUNCIL THE SCOPE OF A NEW HOLIDAY AND/OR PATRIOTIC BANNER PROGRAM

SUMMARY:

A City Council Major Plan to be completed during the 2013-2015 Biennial Budget period is the evaluation of the Holiday Banner Program. This Program, which previously funded the installation of winter holiday banners and spring patriotic banners along all arterial highways, was placed on hiatus during the recent recessionary economic period. The City Council has directed staff to evaluate this Program for potential renewal into a future budget cycle and has requested the Parks and Recreation Commission provide recommendations. Staff has prepared a preliminary review of the Banner Program and has identified several issues that need to be addressed before a final recommendation can be presented to the City Council. The Parks and Recreation Commission is requested to consider the issues raised in this report and make a recommendation on the scope of a new Banner Program.

BACKGROUND:

The City's Holiday Banner Program began not too long after the City's incorporation through City Council action on October 27, 1992. A budget of up to \$20,000 was authorized for the purchase of winter holiday banners at that time. On November 24, 1992, the City Council approved the installation of 125 winter holiday banners along Alicia Parkway, Cabot Road, El Toro Road, La Paz Road, portions of Paseo de Valencia and portions of Moulton Parkway to enhance City identity and civic pride. Over the next dozen years, the program was expanded to include the posting of 300 winter holiday banners on all arterial highways and the installation of patriotic banners in the May to July timeframe with an enhanced annual budget of \$31,000. In 2005, the program was scaled back to the

posting of 150 banners on fewer arterial highways (Alicia Parkway, El Toro Road, Paseo de Valencia and La Paz Road) and subsequently placed on hiatus due to the recessionary economic period. No banner installations were budgeted or installed in the previous two biennial budget periods (2009-2013).

The adoption of the 2013-2015 Fiscal Years Operating Budget included the approval of the City Council designated Major Plan to "Evaluate the return of Holiday Banners during the winter "Seasons Greeting" holiday period and the spring "Patriotic" holiday period." However, in adopting this Major Plan, several City Council members expressed a specific interest in focusing upon a "Patriotic" banner program and to defer winter holiday banners to private shopping centers that already install winter holiday banners. Staff has completed the initial evaluation of a Holiday Banner Program with specific attention to patriotic banners and has identified multiple options that need to be selected before a budget and scope of work can be recommended.

Types of Patriotic Banners

The format and scope of Patriot Banners can include any of the following: (1) The use of generic patriotic banners, such as those currently owned by the City as shown on Attachment One, (2) the creation and use of Military Branch banners highlighting all Service Branches, (3) the creation and use of one Service Branch or one Unit banners, such as to highlight the City's support of the United States Marine Corps Third Battalion Fifth Marine Regiment, (4) the creation and use of banners celebrating Active Duty military personnel, such as the program in place in the City of Yorba Linda as shown on Attachment Two, (5) the creation and use of banners celebrating the sacrifices made by military veterans of certain battles, such as for the 25 Marines that lost their lives during Operation Enduring Freedom (October 2010 to April 2011) in Afghanistan, (6) the creation and use of "Hometown Military Veteran" banners of all Service Branches to recognize military veterans, living or deceased, that call Laguna Hills home, or (7) the sponsoring and display of "Americans Heroes Tribute" banners, which, for a fee provided to that non-profit organization, includes the creation of banners (with the surviving families' consent) as shown on Attachment Three. Additional information on the Americans Heroes Tribute organization can be found at <http://www.americanheroestribute.com>. Any combination of the seven above options could be considered and it is also acceptable for the Commission to recommend that the City not sponsor Holiday Banner Programs.

Timeframe for Displaying Patriotic Banners

In addition to the selection of the type of Patriotic Banners, the timing for the installation and removal of the banners needs to be selected. The reasonable options include: (1) installing the banners in celebration of Veterans Day by showing the banners during the month of November; (2) installing the banners to span the timeframe of Memorial Day to the 4th of July (the typically designated "patriotic season"); (3) both above-mentioned timeframes; or (4) a continuous rotation of banners.

Location for Displaying Patriotic Banners

In addition to the selection of the timeframe for displaying the Patriotic Banners, a decision needs to be made as to where the banners will be installed. Historically, the City has used streetlight poles along Arterial Highways to install the banners. The selection of what streets, one or more, to be designated for the installation of the banners will be needed in order to determine the number of banners to be created. Alternatively, installing the banners only on the Community Center parking lot and walkway light poles and/or on the building would focus the program to this community gathering location.

Due to the range of options for a Patriotic Banner Program and the potential to still include a Holiday Banner Program, the City Council has requested input from the Parks and Recreation Commission. A sample Holiday Banner is shown as Attachment Four.

The recommendations of the Commission will allow staff to fully identify the scope of work and budget for the Program. Staff is obligated to report back to the City Council on these recommendations within 180 days and the Commission can review this matter over more than one meeting.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Holiday Banner Program is not currently funded. The last funding of this Program occurred in FY 2008-09. The evaluation of the Holiday Banner Program will seek to identify a recommended funding level for future Budget consideration.

RECOMMENDATION: THAT THE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION DISCUSS SKATEBOARDING REGULATIONS AT BECKENHAM PARK AND DETERMINE IF THE POSTING OF SIGNAGE TO PROHIBIT SKATEBOARDING AT BECKENHAM PARK SHOULD BE RECOMMENDED TO THE CITY COUNCIL.

SUMMARY:

The City of Laguna Hills received a letter from a resident to express concerns about skateboarding activity at Beckenham Park and how he has to avoid the walkway because of “dangerous stunt” activity with skateboarders. In this letter the resident also questions why certain parks within Laguna Hills are posted with signs to prohibit skateboarding and bicycling, but Beckenham Park does not have these signs posted. The City of Laguna Hills Public Works Director sent a letter to the resident in which he explained park use regulations and the process involved to post signs in public parks to prohibit certain recreation activity. This process first involves the Parks and Recreation Commission’s consideration, as explained in the Public Work Director’s letter. Staff is requesting the Commission to discuss this resident’s request and determine if the posting of “No Skateboarding” signage at Beckenham Park is necessary.

BACKGROUND:

On July 16, 2013, the City of Laguna Hills received a letter from a resident. The letter raises questions about the lawfulness of skateboarding and bicycling in City parks, and the posting of related signage. The resident’s concern is with this type of activity at Beckenham Park. Specifically, he mentions in his letter concerns with pedestrian safety when young men are riding and performing acrobatic tricks on their skate boards near the arched retaining wall near the south end of the park. This letter is attached to this report.

Responding to this resident's inquiry, Mr. Rosenfield, Public Works Director, sent a letter dated August 12, 2013, to this resident in which he explains skateboard regulations in City parks, the perspective of enjoyment of public facilities by all residents, and the process that we employ to prohibit particular activity in a City park. Mr. Rosenfield's letter is also attached to this report.

A summary of the Laguna Hills Municipal Code (LHMC) current regulations pertaining to the skateboarding and bicycles at City Parks is provided below. Chapters 8-04 and 11-32 of the LHMC are included as an attachment to this report for the Commission's reference.

1. Skateboarders and bicyclists are required to yield the right of way to pedestrians on park walkways (LHMC Sections 8-04.170 and 8-04.180).
2. The LHMC does not prohibit skateboarding and/or bicycling in all parks. However, the City Council may designate by resolution any park or portion thereof as a "No Skateboarding" and/or "No Bicycling" area. (LHMC Sections 8-04.170, 11-32.030, and 11-32.040). The City must post appropriate signage at any area so designated prior to enforcing this prohibition. (LHMC Section 11-32.060). A list of the public and private property within the City of Laguna Hills designated as no skateboarding areas by City Council resolution is attached to this report for reference.
3. It is unlawful for any person riding a skateboard to engage in grinding on any public property other than the City's Skate Park (LHMC Section 11-32.110). The term "grinding" refers to the act of sliding with the nonmoving parts of a skateboard on any monument, table, bench, planter, curb, or any other angled object or structure with defined edges (LHMC Section 11-32.010). Irrespective of whether Beckenham Park is designated as a "No Skateboarding" area, the stunt performed on the Park's arched retaining wall, as described by the resident, would constitute unlawful grinding in violation of the LHMC.

In the past few weeks staff has visited Beckenham Park on numerous occasions to assess the skateboarding activity at the park. Staff discovered that the edge of a planter wall in the center of the playground area was waxed to facilitate skate board "grinding." On a few occasions staff witnessed the presence of skateboarders using the park walkway to gain speed to "grind" on the planter wall that stands about a foot high from the ground.

SUBJECT: SKATE BOARD ACTIVITY IN BECKENHAM PARK

Dear Mr. Nuttall,

Thank you, for your July 12th letter addressed to the City Council concerning your observations and concerns about skate board activity at Beckenham Park. In response, I would like to provide you with some background information and describe the steps we plan to undertake with respect to your concerns.

As a general statement, the recreational use of a skate board within a City Park is considered to be an acceptable recreational activity, provided that the user does not cause damage to the park facilities or otherwise create an unsafe condition. This free use and enjoyment of a public facility (without causing damage or unsafe conditions) is essentially the same standard that applies to all users of a City park. Beyond that, however, there is also a provision within the Laguna Hills Municipal Code that specifically prohibits the action of "grinding" by skate board on public property, regardless of the posting of any signage to that effect.

This local ordinance can be enforced when and if a violation is observed by a police officer or a citizen who is willing to file and sign a complaint against the violator. You should know, however, that prior to your communication, the City had not received or observed any issues with regard to skate board use in Beckenham Park. That would best explain why the Park is not currently signed to prohibit skate board usage.

The process we employ when a citizen requests or recommends the prohibition of a particular recreational activity in a City Park is to first present their request and related information to the Parks and Recreation Commission. Following their review and determination regarding the matter, the issue and the Commission's recommendations are then presented to the City Council. The City Council, per the Municipal Code, may then adopt a Resolution prohibiting the use of a skate board in the Park and direct City staff to install the necessary signage.

At the edge of Southport Park on Wilkes Place, there is a large black-and-white sign prohibiting skateboards, rollerblades, etc., in that park, and the Municipal Code is listed.

However, there is no such posting in or at Beckenham Park, which is usually frequented by many more children, dogwalkers, pedestrians, families, et al, than Southport Park.

Most of all, numerous times walking my small dog in Beckenham Park, there has been two or three young men riding or trying to do acrobatic tricks on their skateboards. The most common is at the arched retaining wall near the south end of the park. They try to ride their skateboards on the concrete arch of the retaining wall. I have observed this dangerous stunt numerous times, and watch the young men lose control, stumble away, and their skateboard flips through the air onto the walkway.

With this reckless conduct, I have numerous times had to take another route to avoid injury to my small dog or myself.

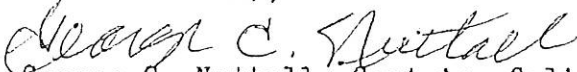
So, I ask the following of the Council:

1. Does the Municipal Code Section quoted on the sign at Southport Park prohibiting skateboards, rollerblades, etc., pertain to all city parks, or only Southport Park?
2. If the quoted Municipal Code pertains to all city parks, why is the same sign not posted and not strictly enforced at Beckenham Park?

Also, is there a Municipal Code prohibiting bicycling in city parks? If not, there should be, to make the parks safer for pedestrians and dogwalkers.

So, please make the city parks safer.

8-04.010 Declaration of purpose.

The purpose of this chapter is to regulate the use of city parks so that all persons may enjoy and make use of the parks. The following regulations apply to all city parks. (Prior code § 8-05.005)

8-04.020 Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

"Alcoholic beverages" means beer, wine, malt liquor, or distilled spirits.

"Athletic fields or courts" means ball diamonds, soccer fields, roller hockey rinks, volleyball and basketball courts, skateboard facilities owned and operated by the city.

"ATV" means an all terrain vehicle as defined in Section 111 of the California Vehicle Code.

"Camp" means to set up or use tents, shacks, movable structures or vehicles, bedrolls, or sleeping bags or other such paraphernalia for overnight sleeping purposes.

"Director" means the Parks and Recreation Director or his or her designee.

"Eviction" means expulsion from the park and, if applicable, revocation of a facility permit.

"Exclusive use" means the right to use a park, or portion thereof, for any activity at a specified time, to the exclusion of all others.

"Facility permit" means written permission by the Director for a specified use of a park area or facility in a park.

"Motorcycle" means any motor vehicle, motorized bicycle, or motor-driven cycle as defined respectively in Sections 400, 405, and 406 of the California Vehicle Code.

"Motorized quadricycle" means a four-wheeled device, as defined in Section 407 of the California Vehicle Code.

"Motorized tricycle" means a three-wheeled device, as defined in Section 407 of the California Vehicle Code.

"Motorized scooter" means any two-wheeled device that has handlebars, is designed to be stood or sat upon by the operator, and is powered by an electric motor that is capable of propelling the device with or without human propulsion, as defined in Section 407.5 of the California Vehicle Code.

"Park" means all city parks, buildings and grounds, athletic fields or courts, and open space areas owned and operated by the city for park, recreation or open space purposes.

"Person" means every individual, firm, corporation, joint venture, association, social club, or any group or combination activity as a unit. (Ord. 2004-12 § 1; Ord. 98-4 § 1: prior code § 8-05.010)

8-04.030 Hours.

All parks shall be open to the public during such hours as may be established by resolution of the City Council. No person, except those having valid facility permits, shall enter or remain in any park at any time other than during such hours as the park is open to the public. (Prior code § 8-05.015)

8-04.040 Facility permit.

A. A facility permit must be obtained from the Director prior to sponsoring or conducting any of the following activities in a park:

1. For the exclusive use of any park area or park facility which has been designated by the Director as requiring a facility permit;
2. For any organized activity in which fifty (50) or more persons are expected to participate or attend, or to which the public is invited or which requires special city services. Such activity includes, but is not limited to: a picnic, rally, group meeting, parade, camp-out, play, musical event, art show, exhibition or, lecture or any type of an entertainment performance;
3. Any activity involving the erection or placement on park property of stages, booths, platforms, sculptures and other art works, or other similar structures;
4. For the sale of any goods, wares, merchandise, food or beverages in connection with a permitted group activity;
5. For any activity involving the use of amplified sound.

B. The Director is expressly delegated the authority to prescribe rules and procedures for the issuance of facility permits and to determine in his or her sole discretion whether to issue a

permit, and in the case of a permit for amplified sound, to determine the maximum amplification permissible consistent with other persons' enjoyment in the park.

C. Facility permits shall be issued on such terms and conditions deemed reasonable by the Director to protect park property and to promote use of the park by all persons.

D. Issuance of a facility permit may be conditioned on the payment of fees as may be established by resolution of the City Council.

E. The denial of a facility permit or the terms and conditions for the issuance of a permit (except the requirement to pay facility permit fees) may be appealed in writing to the City Manager within five business days of the Director's decision. The City Manager's decision on the appeal is final. The City Manager is not required to consider a late-filed appeal.

(Prior code § 8-05.020)

8-04.050 City priority.

With the exception of park use pursuant to a facility permit, city recreational programs, including activities and events co-sponsored by the city, shall have priority of use of all athletic fields or courts. (Ord. 98-4 § 2: prior code § 8-05.023)

8-04.060 Vending and other commercial solicitation.

No person shall solicit primarily for commercial purposes in any manner, or sell or offer for sale any goods, wares, merchandise or food products, or distribute or pass out any primarily commercial handbill or advertising material, provided, however, that this section does not apply to a concession or group activity operated under a facility permit that allows such sales in connection with the permitted activity. (Prior code § 8-05.025)

8-04.070 Camping.

No person shall camp; except that group camping activities for juveniles (under eighteen (18) years of age) under adult supervision may be permitted by the Director, subject to the issuance of a facility permit. (Prior code § 8-05.030)

8-04.080 Signs.

No person shall paint, post, attach or affix any handbill, notice, sign or advertisement upon or to any bridge, fence, building, tree or other property or improvement. With permission of the Director, signs may be posted on a community bulletin board. (Prior code § 8-05.035)

8-04.090 Firearms, weapons, fireworks.

No person shall have any fireworks, firearms, air gun, BB gun, slingshot or bow or hunting arrow or any weapon in his or her possession in a park, nor shall any person discharge any fireworks or weapon upon or into any park. (Prior code § 8-05.040)

8-04.100 Protection of foliage, landscape, historical and park structures, equipment.

A. Except as may be authorized by the Director, no person shall pick flowers, foliage, berries or fruit, or cut, carve, hack, break, dig up, remove, deface, use or in any way mutilate or injure any wood, leaf mold, rock gravel, sand, tree, shrub, plant, fern, grass, turf, mold, artifact, railing, seat, building, barbecue stove, sign, fence, post, structure, toilet, lavatory, restroom, play equipment or any other object in any park.

B. No person shall deface, mar or disfigure any bridge, fence or other structure within a park, or any tree situated in any park, by painting, cutting, scratching or breaking the same or attaching or affixing anything thereto.

C. No person shall climb any tree, or walk, stand or sit upon monuments, signs, buildings, roofs, railing, fences and gates, backstops, tables or upon other property not designated for or customarily used for such purposes.

(Prior code § 8-05.045)

8-04.110 Sanitation.

A. No person shall leave, deposit, drop or scatter any bottles, broken glass, ashes, wastepaper, cans or other rubbish, garbage, litter, refuse or other matter in any park except in a designated rubbish container. No person shall deposit any such matter in the public toilets of any park.

B. When rubbish containers are not available or are full, refuse and rubbish shall be carried away from the park.

C. No person shall excrete or leave any human waste in or on park property, except in a public toilet. Soiled diapers shall be deposited in rubbish containers or removed from the park.

(Prior code § 8-05.050)

8-04.120 Barbecues and fires.

No person shall build, light, kindle or maintain any open or outdoor fire at any place in a park except in park facilities especially provided for this purpose. No person shall bring portable BBQs or hibachis into a park. (Prior code § 8-05.055)

8-04.130 Animals.

A. Except for seeing eye dogs, cats, dogs or other domestic animals shall be restrained by a substantial leash, not to exceed six feet in length, and shall be in the charge of a person competent to restrain such animal. This section shall not prevent the city or its facility permittees from holding supervised public events in which domestic animals participate, nor shall it prohibit the Director from issuing facility permits for group activities involving domestic animals.

B. Domestic animal waste shall be removed from the park, or it shall be disposed of in park rubbish containers by the person in charge of the animal.

C. No person shall trap, kill, wound or maltreat any bird or animal, or permit any domestic animal under their control to pursue, trap, kill or wound any bird or other domestic animal.

D. Horses or pack animals are not permitted, except on designated equestrian trails.

(Prior code § 8-05.060)

8-04.140 Glass beverage containers.

No person shall bring into a park or have in his or her possession in a park a glass beverage container. (Prior code § 8-05.065)

8-04.150 Alcoholic beverages.

No person shall consume, possess or sell any alcoholic beverages within a park. (Prior code § 8-05.070)

8-04.160 Motor vehicles or similar conveyances.

Except for motorized wheelchairs or other similar conveyances for the disabled, and motorized vehicles used for park maintenance, no person shall operate or drive any motor vehicle,

motorcycle, ATV, motorized quadricycle, motorized tricycle, or motorized scooter in a park, nor shall any person clean, wash, polish or make any repairs to any such vehicle, cycle, or scooter in a park. (Ord. 2004-12 § 2: prior code § 8-05.075)

8-04.170 Bicycles.

Bicyclists shall yield the right-of-way to pedestrians on park walkways. All bicycles shall be parked in a bicycle rack when one is provided and space is available. No person shall leave a bicycle on athletic fields or courts, in the play equipment area or on sidewalks. No person shall ride a bicycle in a park or portion thereof which has been posted as a "No Bicycling Area" pursuant to Chapter [11-32](#) of this code. (Ord. 98-4 § 3: prior code § 8-05.080)

8-04.180 Skateboarding and rollerskating.

Rollerskaters (including rollerbladers) and skateboarders shall yield the right of way to pedestrians on park walkways. No person shall leave a skateboard or rollerskates (including rollerblades) on athletic fields or courts, in the play equipment area or on sidewalks. No person shall skateboard or use rollerskates as defined in Chapter [11-32](#) of this code in a park or portion thereof which has been posted as a "No Skateboarding" or "No Rollerskating" area pursuant to Chapter [11-32](#) of this code. (Ord. 98-4 § 4: prior code § 8-05.085)

8-04.190 Park closure.

The Director may close parks or any portion thereof when such areas are filled to capacity or a hazardous condition poses potential danger to citizens, city employees or city property. Any such closure shall be for the duration of the capacity or hazardous condition situation as determined by the Director. (Prior code § 8-05.090)

8-04.200 Effect of park regulations and enforcement.

The privilege of any person to use the parks is expressly conditioned upon compliance by that person with the provisions of this chapter as they apply to such use. A violation of any provision of this chapter shall be deemed an infraction punishable by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25.00); a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for a second violation within one year of the first; and a fine of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for each additional violation within one year of the first. In addition, the person shall be subject to eviction from the park in which the violation occurs and other parks if necessary, all in accordance with the procedures in Section [8-04.210](#) of this chapter. This chapter shall be enforced by the Director and such of his or her agents as he or she may designate to perform said duty, as well as by peace officers having jurisdiction of any area in which a violation of any provision of the chapter may take place. (Prior code § 8-05.100)

8-04.210 Eviction.

A. A person is subject to eviction from a park when the following conditions occur:

1. The person is in violation of a park regulation;
2. The person has been warned in a manner that is reasonably calculated to reach that person that eviction may result from any further violation;
3. After receiving such warning, a further violation occurs;
4. No lesser sanction reasonably appears to suffice.

However, where a violation is of such magnitude or seriousness of violence, no warnings will be necessary prior to eviction.

B. A group is subject to eviction from the park when any one of the following conditions occur and no lesser sanction reasonably appears to suffice:

1. There is probable cause to believe that an unlawful assembly exists pursuant to California Penal Code Section 407;
2. There is a clear and present danger of imminent violence which cannot reasonably be forestalled without evicting the entire group;
3. There exists a group sponsored or organized activity which violates one or more park regulations and such group sponsored organized activity has not ceased as a result of one or more warnings given to the permit applicant and the group as a whole;
4. There are multiple individual violations of park regulations which have not stopped following the eviction of one or more such individual violators and violations continue after the group has had a reasonable opportunity to cure them.

(Prior code § 8-05.105)

8-04.220 Community center and sports complex.

A. Any person riding a skateboard or rollerblading at the skateboard facility shall wear a helmet, elbow pads, and kneepads.

B. Because of the particular design features of the skateboard facility, skateboarding at the facility is considered stunt, trick, or luge skateboarding.

C. Signs shall be posted at the skateboard facility to afford reasonable notice:

1. That any person riding a skateboard or rollerblading must wear a helmet, elbow pads, and kneepads, and any person failing to do so will be subject to citation under the city's code;
2. That rollerblading by adults and skateboarding by persons over the age of fourteen (14) are deemed to be hazardous recreational activities and that the city may not be liable for injuries incurred by such persons participating in rollerblading and/or skateboarding at the skateboard facility.

D. Any person who is injured at the skateboard facility shall report the injury to city staff and shall complete an injury report form.

E. Any person using the skateboard facility is subject to the following rules and regulations:

1. The skateboard facility has been designed for use without the introduction of any outside obstacles, ramps, rails, or other similar materials or devices. Consequently, bringing to the facility or using any outside obstacles, ramps, rails, or other similar materials or devices at the skateboard facility is prohibited;
2. The hours of operation for the skateboard facility are from eight a.m. to ten p.m. Use of the skateboard facility outside of the hours of operation is prohibited. In addition, use of the skateboard facility after sundown when the skateboard facility lights are not on is prohibited;
3. Food and beverages are prohibited within the limits of the grinding rail at the skateboard facility;

4. Glass products, glass bottles, glass beverage containers, and any other type of glass object or material are prohibited;
 5. The skateboard facility is a smoke-free area. The use of cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, or the use of any other type of tobacco or smoking product is prohibited;
 6. The use of scooters, as defined in Section 11-32.010, is prohibited;
 7. The use of profanity is prohibited; and
 8. The Director of Community Services, or his or her designee, may, in his or her sole discretion, regulate the hours of operation at the skateboard facility for specified groups of users. The city shall post such regulations in appropriate signage at the skateboard facility. Any first violation shall be deemed an infraction and shall be punishable as set forth in Section 11-32.080.
- F. The use of scooters, as defined in Section 11-32.010, skateboards, and bicycles are prohibited within the roller hockey rink.

(Ord. 2004-3 § 2; Ord. 2000-4 § 1)

11-32.010 Definitions.

As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have meanings as set forth below.

“Business district” is defined as designated in Section 235 of the California Vehicle Code.

“Grinding” is a slang skate term, and alternative sport, which refers to the act of sliding on any monument, sign, building, roof railing, fence, gate, table, bench, planter, curb, bleachers, stairway, rail, handrail, fountain, or any other angled object or structure with defined edges by a person utilizing or riding upon any nonrolling part of rollerskates, skateboards, bicycles, or scooters.

“Park” means all city parks, buildings and grounds, athletic fields or courts, and open space areas owned and operated by the city for park, recreation, or open space purposes.

“Private property” means any property held by private interests which is used primarily for business, commercial, or recreational purposes.

“Public property” means any property owned or maintained by the city of Laguna Hills or by the Saddleback Valley Unified School District.

“Rollerskate” means any footwear, or device which may be attached to the foot or footwear, to which wheels are attached and such wheels may be used to aid the wearer in moving or propulsion.

“Skateboard” means a board of any material, which has wheels attached to it and which is propelled or moved by human, gravitational, or mechanical power, and to which there is not fixed any device or mechanism to turn or control the wheels.

“Scooter” mean any foot-operated device consisting of a narrow footboard mounted between two wheels tandem with an upright steering handle attached to the front wheel, which is

propelled by human, gravitational, or mechanical energy. (Ord. 2000-5 § 1: prior code § 6-12.010)

11-32.020 Bicycle operation.

A. Riding in Group. Persons operating bicycles within a bicycle lane or upon a bicycle path shall ride in single file except as provided for in CVC Section 21202(a).

B. Direction of Travel. Persons riding or operating a bicycle on a bicycle trail or path may proceed in either direction except on those trails or paths designated for one-way traffic by appropriate markings or signs defined by the direction of adjacent vehicular traffic.

C. Walking Bicycles. Bicycles may be walked subject to all provisions of law applicable to pedestrians.

D. Yielding Right-of-Way. Whenever any person is riding a bicycle upon a sidewalk, such person shall yield right-of-way to any and all pedestrians. A person riding a bicycle upon entering a roadway or driveway from a sidewalk shall yield to all traffic.

(OCC §§ 6-4-500, 6-4-501(d))

11-32.030 General prohibition.

A. It is unlawful and subject to punishment in accordance with Section 11-32.080 of this chapter for any person utilizing or riding upon rollerskates, bicycles, skateboards, scooters, or similar devices to ride or move about in or on any public or private property when the same has been designated by resolution of the City Council and posted as a no rollerskating, skateboarding, bicycling or scooter area.

B. It is unlawful and subject to punishment in accordance with Section 11-32.080 of this chapter, for any person utilizing or riding upon rollerskates or skateboards, or similar devices to ride upon the roadway of any public street, except cul-de-sac streets of five hundred (500) feet or less in length.

(Ord. 2000-5 § 2: prior code § 6-12.020)

11-32.040 Designation of public property as no rollerskating, skateboarding, bicycling or scooter area.

The City Council may designate any public sidewalk or other public property as a no rollerskating, skateboarding, bicycling or scooter area. The City Council shall designate such area by resolution and order the posting of appropriate signage in accordance with Section 11-32.060 of this chapter. Notice of the City Council's proposed designation shall be provided as follows:

A. For sidewalks on highways, listed in the master plan of arterial highways, the City Clerk shall cause notice of City Council consideration of such action to be published in a newspaper of general circulation at least five days prior to the City Council consideration.

B. For other public property the City Clerk shall cause additional notice of City Council consideration by means of posting such notice along the highway or sidewalk or on the public property.

(Ord. 2000-5 § 3, prior code § 6-12.030)

11-32.050 Designation of private property as no rollerskating, skateboarding, bicycling or scooter area.

The City Council may, by resolution, designate any private property within a business district, or which is primarily used for commercial or recreational purposes, as a no rollerskating, skateboarding, bicycling or scooter area. The City Council may so designate this private property subject to the following:

- A. If the property is owner/occupied property, the property owner shall submit a written petition requesting a designation of no rollerskating, skateboarding, bicycling, or scooter area.
- B. If the property is occupied by tenants of the owner, then the tenants shall submit a written petition by a majority of the tenants on the property supporting a designation of a no rollerskating, skateboarding, bicycling or scooter area and the petition shall also contain written consent of the property owner.
- C. The City Clerk shall cause notice of City Council consideration of this petition to be mailed to all tenants in the subject private property as well as to the owner at least five days prior to City Council consideration.

The City Council may approve or deny the request for designation of the no rollerskating, skateboarding, bicycling or scooter area. (Ord. 2000-5 § 4: prior code § 6-12.040)

11-32.060 Posting of signs required—Content.

Prior to the enforcement of the prohibition of rollerskating, skateboarding, bicycling, and/or scooting, the area so designated shall be posted with signs that provide substantially as follows:

The use of rollerskates, skateboards, bicycles and/or scooters is prohibited by Laguna Hills Municipal Code. Any violation is punishable by a fine of \$50.00 for a first offense.

Such prohibition shall apply to the property or area so designated once posted in plain view at all entrances to the property or area, and on signs which are not less than seventeen (17) by twenty-one (21) inches in size with lettering not less than one inch in height. All costs relating to the posting and obtaining of the signs for private property shall be the responsibility of the property owners or tenants who submitted the written petition described in Section 11-32.050 of this chapter. (Ord. 2000-5 § 5: prior code § 6-12.050)

11-32.070 Fees set by resolution.

The City Council may, by resolution, establish fees for the receipt and processing of petitions for no rollerskating, skateboarding, bicycling, and/or scooter areas. In addition, the City Council may, by resolution, establish fees sufficient to cover the costs of developing, printing, and posting the areas so designated pursuant to this chapter. (Ord. 2000-5 § 6: prior code § 6-12.060)

11-32.080 Violation—Penalty and enforcement.

A. Any violation of this chapter is deemed an infraction, punishable by a fine of fifty dollars (\$50.00). A second violation of this chapter shall be punishable by a fine of one hundred dollars (\$100.00), and a third and subsequent violation shall be deemed a misdemeanor.

B. The privilege of any person to use the parks is expressly conditioned upon compliance by that person with the provisions of this chapter as they apply to such use. In addition to being subjected to the fine schedule set forth in this section, a person is subject to immediate eviction from the park in which the violation occurs, and other parks if necessary, where a person is found to be in violation of this chapter.

C. In addition, with respect to adults whose rollerskating, skateboarding, scootering, or bicycling activities are in violation of this chapter and where such activities result in damage to public property, the city may pursue a civil complaint in tort against that person for property damage caused by such activity. With respect to minors whose rollerskating, skateboarding, scootering, or bicycling activities are in violation of this chapter and where such activities result in damage to public property, the city may, pursuant to California Civil Code section 1714.1, pursue a civil complaint in tort for property damage caused by such activity against the minor's parent or guardian having custody and control of the minor.

(Ord. 2000-5 § 7: prior code § 6-12.070)

11-32.090 Exemption for the provisions of this chapter.

Any devices designed, intended, and used solely of the transportation of infants, the handicapped, or incapacitated persons, or devices designed, intended, and used for the transportation of merchandise to and from the place of purchase and other wheeled devices, when being used for either of these purposes, shall be exempt from the provisions of this chapter. Furthermore, the City Council may, by resolution, suspend the enforcement of the provisions of this chapter to accommodate special events when so requested by the event organizer. (Prior code § 6-12.080)

11-32.100 Supersedes Orange County Codified Ordinances.

This chapter supersedes Orange County Code Sections 6-4-502 and 6-4-501(a) through (c), but not Section 6-4-501(d). (Prior code § 6-12.090)

11-32.110 Grinding prohibited.

It is unlawful and subject to punishment in accordance with Section 11-32.080 of this chapter for any person riding upon rollerskates, skateboards, scooters, bicycles, or any other similar devices that are propelled or moved by human, gravitational, or mechanical energy, to engage in grinding upon public property, including grinding on any monument, sign, building, roof railing, hand railing, fence, gate, table, bench, planter, curb, bleacher, fountain, stairway, or any other equipment or structure located within a park. Such prohibition shall not apply to the skateboard facility. (Ord. 2000-5 § 8)

11-32.111 Riding upon rollerskates, skateboards, bicycles, and scooters permissible only in certain areas within the Laguna Hills Community Center and Sports Complex facility.

A. Rollerskates. It is unlawful and subject to punishment in accordance with Section 11-32.080 of this chapter for any person utilizing or riding upon rollerskates within the Laguna Hills Community Center and Sports Complex facility to ride or move about on such equipment in any area other than in the skateboard facility, hockey rink, or on the park walkways. Persons utilizing or riding upon rollerskates within the Laguna Hills Community Center and Sports Complex facility are expressly prohibited from riding or moving about on such equipment on any monument, sign, building, roof, railing, fence, gate, table, bench, planter, curb, bleacher, stair, step, stairway, handrail, fountain, sculpture, play equipment, rubberized surface, or fixture of any kind located within the Community Center and Sports Complex.

B. Skateboard. It is unlawful and subject to punishment in accordance with Section 11-32.080 of this chapter for any person utilizing or riding upon a skateboard within the Laguna Hills Community Center and Sports Complex facility to ride or move about on such equipment in any area other than in the skateboard facility or on the park walkways. Persons utilizing or riding upon a skateboard within the Laguna Hills Community Center and Sports Complex facility are expressly prohibited from riding or moving about on such equipment on any

monument, sign, building, roof, railing, fence, gate, table, bench, planter, curb, bleacher, stair, step, stairway, handrail, fountain, sculpture, play equipment, rubberized surface or fixture of any kind located within the Community Center and Sports Complex.

C. Scooter or Bicycle. It is unlawful and subject to punishment in accordance with Section 11-32.080 of this chapter for any person utilizing or riding upon a scooter or a bicycle within the Laguna Hills Community Center and Sports Complex facility to ride or move about on such equipment in any area other than on the park walkways. Persons utilizing or riding upon a scooter or a bicycle within the Laguna Hills Community Center and Sports Complex facility are expressly prohibited from riding or moving about on such equipment on any monument, sign, building, roof, railing, fence, gate, table, bench, planter, curb, bleacher, stair, step, stairway, handrail, fountain, sculpture, play equipment, rubberized surface, or fixture of any kind located within the Community Center and Sports Complex.

(Ord. 2001-2 § 1, 2001)

The Laguna Hills Municipal Code is current through Ordinance 2013-1, passed March 26, 2013.

ISSUE: 2014 EARTH DAY LAGUNA HILLS

**RECOMMENDATION: THAT THE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION
PROVIDE FEEDBACK TO STAFF ON THE 2014 EARTH DAY LAGUNA HILLS EVENT.**

SUMMARY:

The 2014 Earth Day Laguna Hills event is scheduled for Saturday, April 19, 2014. Past projects have included multiple trail clean-ups, painting projects, a Green Expo, and for 2013, a free document shredding service. Despite the addition of new activities, event participation numbers have waned in recent years, and as a result staff is seeking feedback from the Parks and Recreation Commission on the event and its associated projects for 2014.

BACKGROUND:

The 2014 Earth Day Laguna Hills event is scheduled for Saturday, April 19, 2014 between the hours of 9:00am and 12:00pm. As the Commission will recall, for the 2013 event sixty-three (63) volunteers were welcomed by Council Members, Commissioners and staff before exploring the Green Expo and venturing off to assist in the clean-up of nearby trails and the planting of fifteen trees in recognition of Arbor Day. New for the 2013 event was a free document shredding service. Nearly 12,000 pounds of paper was shredded and diverted from local landfills.

Despite the addition of the Green Expo, additional activities for children including an art contest and crafts, and the document shredding event, total participation for the Earth Day Laguna Hills event has declined in recent years. Table 1 below shows event participation numbers for 2010-2013.

* An additional 65 people attended the "Green Expo" and Wyland exhibit without assisting with projects.

Staff is seeking input from the Parks and Recreation Commission regarding the future of the event and what projects the Commission believes to be worthwhile. Based on the low participation numbers in recent years, staff is considering eliminating the Green Expo and simply having volunteers plant trees in recognition of Arbor Day and clean City trails. The Green Expo requires a large amount of staff time to coordinate, and participating groups may be difficult to recruit based on our track record of attendance.

It is important to note that staff is working with CR&R for the City to host a mulch collection event at the Laguna Hills High School on April 19, 2014. The regional event will allow patrons to collect bags of mulch from the Laguna Hills High School parking lot. Residents from all of the South County cities that are serviced by CR&R are invited to participate in this event.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The FY 2013/14 budget for Earth Day Laguna Hills is \$1,000. Event expenditures totaled \$992.50 for the 2013 Earth Day Laguna Hills.

ISSUE: HEALTHY EATING ACTIVE LIVING CAMPAIGN

RECOMMENDATION: THAT THE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION DETERMINE IF THE CITY SHOULD APPLY TO PARTICIPATE IN THE HEALTHY EATING ACTIVE LIVING CAMPAIGN.

SUMMARY:

The League of California Cities (League) adopted a resolution in 2004 that laid the groundwork for the development of the Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) Campaign. Acknowledging that obesity is an epidemic problem in California and in the nation, the Heal Campaign's purpose is to support cities in their efforts to improve the physical environment and give residents more opportunities to be physically active and eat healthy foods. The City of Laguna Hills already has several policies in its General Plan that focus on the health wellness of the community. Staff is requesting that the Parks and Recreation Commission determine if the City of Laguna Hills should apply to this campaign to become a HEAL City.

BACKGROUND:

In 2004, the League of California Cities (League) adopted an Annual Conference Resolution to encourage cities to embrace policies that facilitate activities to promote healthier lifestyles and communities, including healthy diet and nutrition, and to adopt city design and planning principles that enable citizens of all ages and abilities to undertake exercise. The outcome of the League's initial effort was the development of the Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) Campaign. The HEAL campaign is a partnership composed of the League, California Center for Public Health Advocacy, and the Cities, Counties and Schools Partnership. The purpose of the HEAL Campaign is to raise awareness about health concerns in the community and to encourage city officials to adopt policies to

improve their community's physical activity and food environments. This program is funded by Kaiser Permanente.

At the core of the HEAL Campaign is an acknowledgement that obesity is a serious problem to cities and residents (see "Cities Role in Reversing the Obesity Epidemic" attached). The campaign is concerned with curbing the obesity epidemic by encouraging all California cities to adopt policies considered key to being a healthy and active community. These policies championed by the HEAL Campaign fall under three general categories:

1. Land Use;
2. Availability of Healthy Food Choices; and
3. Employee Wellness.

The City of Laguna Hills demonstrates commitment to many of the policies advocated through the HEAL campaign. For example, in addition to the City's parks, trails and open space, the General Plan includes several goals and policies that promote health wellness for the community such as expanding the City's trails system, improving access to healthy foods by encouraging community gardens and farmers markets, and providing recreation opportunities to all age groups. Further, the City of Laguna Hills introduced the Get Fit Campaign in 2005 as an initiative designed to target the rising obesity rates in our community and throughout the country. The Get Fit Campaign began with staff training, improvements in the nutritional choices offered in programs and implementation of new nutrition and exercise based classes. In regards to employee wellness initiatives, the City has offered its employees recreation activities such as a Pilates class and group volleyball games during lunch.

The following Orange County cities are currently participating in the HEAL Campaign.

- Brea
- Dana Point
- Fullerton
- Irvine
- Mission Viejo
- Newport Beach
- Placentia
- San Clemente
- Santa Ana

A summary of the steps involved to become a HEAL City and the different designations are provided in the "Is Your City a Healthy Eating Active Living City?" flyer that is attached to this report. It is staff's opinion that if this initiative is pursued, the City of Laguna Hills could qualify for the "Active Cities" designation. To attain this designation, as described in the attached flyer, the City would need to already have adopted and implemented policies, and the City Council would need to adopt a Resolution with a commitment to implement new policies.

Staff is requesting that the Parks and Recreation Commission consider the merits of this campaign and determine if the City of Laguna Hills should apply to become a HEAL City. The Commission's recommendation will be brought to the City Council for its consideration.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Staff anticipates nominal staff costs to apply for and support the HEAL Campaign.

Cities' Role in Reversing the Obesity Epidemic

Due to the rapid rise in obesity, today's youth may—for the first time in modern history—live shorter lives than their parents.¹

Cities and their residents are facing increased health care costs and diminished quality of life due to the epidemic of obesity and overweight. City leaders across California are stepping up to help stem the obesity epidemic in their communities. This fact sheet is intended to help city council members and executive city staff see how municipalities can help reduce obesity and overweight through policies that advance healthy eating and active living.



Obesity and Overweight Cost Cities in Health Care, Preventable Disease, and Lost Productivity

California's children are suffering from overweight and its effects:

- On average, one in four California youth between the ages of 9 and 16 is overweight; in many California cities, that statistic is one in three
- More children are being diagnosed with diseases linked to overweight and obesity previously seen only in adults, such as Type 2 diabetes and heart disease
- Overweight children are far more likely to be obese as adults²

California's adults face serious problems from obesity:

- More than half of California's adults are overweight or obese: 23 percent are obese and another 35 percent are overweight³
- Obese adults face increased risks for many chronic conditions: diabetes, heart disease, cancer, arthritis, stroke, and hypertension⁴
- Each year in California, obesity is directly or indirectly responsible for hundreds of deaths and thousands of hospitalizations⁵
- In 2006, the annual cost to California—in medical bills, workers compensation and lost productivity—for overweight, obesity, and physical inactivity was \$41 billion⁶



The Healthy Eating Active Living Cities Campaign provides training and technical assistance to help city officials adopt policies that improve their communities' physical activity and retail food environments. Supporting healthy choices is essential to address the obesity epidemic among California's children and adults, currently costing the state more than \$41 billion annually in healthcare and lost productivity.

The Campaign, funded by Kaiser Permanente and the Vitamin Cases Consumer Settlement Fund, is a partnership of the League of California Cities, the California Center for Public Health Advocacy, and the Cities Counties and Schools Partnership.

Low-Income Communities Fare Worst

Rates of obesity are highest and have risen most rapidly among people of color and in low-income communities, where choices for healthy eating and physical activity are limited.⁷ Even after accounting for individual risk factors such as socioeconomic status and race/ethnicity, living in a community that has a lot more unhealthy food outlets is associated with significantly higher rates of obesity and diabetes than living in a community with more opportunities to buy healthy food.⁴

Cities Have an Important Role in Obesity Prevention

Increasingly, policymakers, advocates, and health care providers are recognizing the influence of community factors on health,⁸ including the following:

- Local access to healthy foods
- Safe places to play and be active
- Opportunities for people to walk and bike within their neighborhoods

City councils can improve the physical activity and food environments in their cities and contribute to preventing obesity among their employees and residents through:

- Internal personnel policies
- Land use decisions
- Redevelopment priorities
- Community and economic development plans

In conjunction with leaders from 100 California Cities, the Healthy Eating Active Living Cities Campaign has developed policy recommendations that could improve the food and physical activity environments in communities, available at www.HealCitiesCampaign.org.

SUMMARY:

At the conclusion of each quarter, staff prepares a summary of Community Services Programs and a staff level critique of the City's quarterly offerings to keep the Commission apprised of the accomplishments and out comings of the Department. A total of 1,377 participants were enrolled in programs for the summer 2013 quarter. Revenue for the summer quarter totaled \$107,693.

BACKGROUND:

A number of other programs were successful during the summer quarter. In the Cultural Arts category, the Shakespeare in the Hills performances of Much Ado About Nothing were very popular with three hundred fifty-nine (359) participants attending. Also well attended in the summer quarter were the Community Services summer day camp and teen camps. These camps offered a variety of activities as well as excursions to Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, San Diego Zoo and Raging Waters.

The Circle of Friends program continued to offer its monthly events, with the highlight of the summer season being the Pizza and Movie Night which drew a crowd of nineteen participants. Table 1 provides an event attendance comparison for the Circle of Friends Pizza & Movie Night for the previous three years.
